
The Story of Sam Ashaolu

I am standing here by no accident...

I was well known for my great skills on the basketball court. I have received many awards and was the player to watch.

I received a scholarship to Duquesne University for this talent. I had a dream.

This dream was soon to be realized as I was reported to be the next Canadian success story on the basketball court. The media was watching me play because I was one of the top Canadian players. But that fateful night in Pittsburgh, on September 17, 2006--it changed my life. I was with fellow team mates returning from a school dance. An argument ensued and surprisingly shots rang out. Four of us were hit with the stray bullets. I suffered the most serious injuries.





"One bullet lodged in my neck, the other in the back of my head"

I laid in a coma for three weeks; the doctors had little conclusive information as to what the outcome would be. I underwent several operations and the prognosis was still bleak. The quality of life that I would have was in question. The doctors could only assume that I would require continual 24 hour care at best. They could not determine if I would ever walk or speak properly ever again.

I defied the odds. For two months of intense physiotherapy I worked at regaining my motor skills and memory function. Six days a week I transformed my life by the rigorous and grueling schedule that was the main stay of my life.

Every day I had to deal with this new reality; dealing with my damaged body, facing

physical and mental limitations and then,

the loss of becoming a professional basketball player.

All this and, I DID NOT GIVE UP.





Now I want to share my story:

I grew up in Rexdale with my mom and 3 brothers. Growing up in Rexdale my brothers and I worked hard to avoid drugs and gangs.

I worked hard and earned my Bachelors in Communications and in Social Work. I enjoy working with at risk youth. For the past few years, I have had several speaking and coaching engagements and would like to continue getting my message across to people who are thinking of giving up on their dreams and speak about what it took for me to get a scholorship to a Division 1 University and all the obstacles I had to go through despite being one of the Top high school basketball players. I also run after-school programs and workshops that focuses on Life-skills, Employment, Education and Financial Literacy. I recall the fateful night at Duquesne University and what it took to come to terms of what had just happened to me, my intense rehabilitation, and how hard I worked to have a normal life. My story resonated with everybody out there chasing their dreams, with kids and adults because it inspires them to go after their dreams and to make better choices in an ever-changing world.

When speaking to kids I hope to instill the importance of:

- 1. Pursuing an education...sports do eventually expire and an alternate path is required.
- 2. Work to achieve your dreams.
- 3. Never giving up on your dreams is the key to success.
- 4. Making better choices to avoid situations that could lead to catastrophic events.


